She set the standard for all missionary women who have followed. Ann lives on as a sterling example of deep love, unswerving faith, and dauntless courage. And So It Begins—On May 11, 1888, in the basement of Broad Street Methodist Church in Richmond, Virginia, 32 women from 12 states gathered to harness the power of the missionary impulse stirring across America. Three days later came the vote to organize.
